We were very excited this term to receive two very important awards. We were awarded a National Educator Award for Innovative Design. This is based on our work on Hubs and the spaces that our students are using in Stage 4. The flexibility of the environment and the pedagogical design around Hubs, Pods and Huddles is instrumental in the design process and the way the students work. Our staff have worked to perfect the practice in classrooms and we are seeing the great outcomes for our students.

We then also received a NSW Secretary's Award for Innovations in Schools. This was an Award from Mark Scott and was presented to us at the Sydney Town Hall. Again, this was around th3e new design for learning. We have now had over 30 schools from across the State come to visit us and learn more about the learning. While the work has been hard and different, as innovation always is- we are continuing to make it even better. Some Year 11 classes are learning in hubs in English and Stage 5 students have started to prototype the use of REAL projects in their subjects.

The 7 and 8 360 interviews get better and better each time we run them. These evenings are all about student responsibility for learning. They have time with their parents to showcase their leaning and show what they have created and completed and how they

are meeting their personal learning goals. It seems that for some people 20 minutes is still not long enough!

We had over 100 parents attend our Transition night last Tuesday, listening to the way we work at KKHS for High school in 2019.

So, it certainly feels like the airport terminal here at the moment, so many entry and exit points, so many things taking off and landing. We commend our newsletter to you to enjoy the journeys with us.

Deputy Principal Report Years 7 & 10 - Mrs Somerville (Rel)

This term has continued to be a busy one where I have continued to learn so many things.

I have worked closely with our careers advisor Mr Kinley and staff across the school to make sure that Year 10 were able to make informed decisions about their pattern of study for next year. We held an information night where parents and students were able to ask questions about subjects and understand the changes that are in place for students as they progress into the senior years.

ATAR? Non ATAR? Pathways? TAFE? Studio School?

These were some of the issues raised "Try a Course"...a found the information helpful. Year 10 also had the opportunity to experience two days of Year 11 subjects with the "Try A Course" before picking their subjects. This was a successful experience where the students were able to have more of an understanding of the

successful experience where the students were able to have more of an understanding of the courses available to them as senior students.

courses available to them as senior students. Subject selections have been finalised and thank you to those parents who were a part of the interview process. We understand that it is often difficult to be available during the day and appreciate your involvement. I am currently in the process of going through the selections made by the students and determining the courses that will run next year. Students will be informed of this once the process has been completed.

As the term moves forward, the Year 10 Year Advisor, Mrs Douglas has started making plans for the end of year celebration. Just a reminder that to be invited to the celebration, students must have their attendance at or above 75%, have not had a long suspension or more than two short suspensions and have completed all work as well as their Authentic Assessment interview. Students also need to have met their responsibilities as a member of the school community by ensuring that all fees associated with electives have been met. If you are unsure if your student is eligible at this point, please contact the school and we can pass on the information.

Year 7 have also been busy this term putting their creative and critical thinking skills to use through their recent project. Many students have been involved in designing and building gardens from recycled materials, reflecting their understanding of how we can be sustainable. Students also conducted experiments, developed folios, completed research on gardens and used their numeracy skills to design their garden beds. Many of them are now completed and are brightening up areas around the school. Year 7's next topic is 'Game on – How can I create the future?' and from seeing the fun they were having on their Hook Day-I can not wait to see what they come up with next!









Deputy Principal Report Years 8 & 11 - Mrs Pratt

...students will still be learning through project and group involve content and outcomes from more than one subject.

Its been a really exciting time for year 8. The electives next year will run for a semester, with students participating in two electives each semester. Staff work. We will also be had a wonderful time designing some creating projects that new electives for students to select for next year, creating a grand total of 76! The overviews of the electives have been added to a Canvas course for all students to review and to shortlist. Last time I checked, some students

had been in the course looking over these for well over an hour in total. The descriptions of each elective are only general, allowing for student input into the creation and direction of the projects.

At the same time, Head Teachers have been designing Scope and Sequences for core subjects. Next year, there will be no hubs, but students will still be learning through project and group work. We will also be creating projects that involve content and outcomes from more than one subject. This year, we have done this with our current year 9 – a narrative task was used to assess outcomes in both History and English. A majority of students (over 70%) surveyed felt that this process improved both their ability to write the narrative and their

Deputy Principal Alan Hope says "Hub learning has meant changing the entire way the learning environment looks, the increase in class size and subsequent teaching practices, takes collaboration from the ground up to be a success. It involved structural changes to create appropriate classroom space and room design, it took student feedback and of course staff professional development to make it a success."

The primary objective of undertaking such innovations in curriculum and subsequently the design of learning areas is to increase student engagement and prepare students for the world of the future. The case for change is widely acknowledged. It is taking the plunge and making change happen that is setting Kurri Kurri High School apart from more traditional teaching models.

Year 11 Biology and Investigating Science students travelled to the Hunter Wetlands **Environmental Education Centre to** participate in a range of fieldwork activities, confidently identify^{to} gain a deeper understanding of their current course work. The group of students took part in many first-hand investigations, using the primary data to aid their in-

class study for upcoming exams. An all-round favourite amongst the group was dip netting, where students had the opportunity to collect pond animals and confidently identify the different species and their individual adaptations. Moreover, the students observed the biotic and abiotic factors of their surrounding environment and learnt the ways in which humans, both positively and negatively, impact their own ecosystem. Overall the excursion significantly benefited the students' knowledge and understanding of the impacts that environmental change has within an ecosystem, in an enjoyable, interactive setting!
















As we look to the energy challenges of the future, we can rely on our students to come up with the solutions.

This semester in STEM, Year 8 have been learning about the importance of energy through the second major project "How can we ensure an ongoing energy supply in Kurri Kurri?" To make the learning authentic, students constructed model houses and have recently designed and built electric circuits that they have added to their houses. Students have

clearly shown the benefits of HUB learning in the effective collaboration and problem solving skills used to complete this work. By the end of this project, students will have learned about heat transfer and then transformed this learning into the effective insulation of their model houses. What's Hubbening in Year 7?

Year 7's most recent project has focussed around the question "Is it easy being green?" During this project, students learned about the importance of creating a sustainable world. Sustainability is one of the Cross Curriculum Priorities set out in the Australian Curriculum and it is a feature of all NSW NESA Syllabuses.

Thinking scientifically, students created experiments growth.

This project introduced students to geographical concepts of sustainable water use and how to create liveable spaces. their own science Thinking scientifically, students created their own science experiments around the factors around the factors influencing plant growth. Their legacy influencing plant product was a garden which they made from recycled materials. They had to make these gardens using design thinking and showed

their journey through a folio for Technology Mandatory.

While the project was underway, students still engaged in literacy and

English tasks, in order to improve their reading and writing skills, and numeracy and mathematics tasks around length, perimeter, area and volume – they even delved into the wonderful world of Pythagoras' Theorem. Mathspace has been a wonderful tool for numeracy and has helped students to really take control of their own learning paths.

We have just started our third and final project. The guestion for this project is "Game on! How can I create the future?" Students began with a hook day during which they participated in arrange of different games. During this project, students will be learning about interconnections, coding, film studies, forces, algebra and angles.

Thank you to everyone who attended their child's 7-360 conference. The students really enjoyed showing their parents the goals they have achieved so far this year.

Term 3 has been an exciting, challenging and rewarding time in The Studio School. As a program aimed at improving the self-directed skills of the students, with a strong focus on Transition to Work, things have been moving at a fast pace. Some students have graduated (obtained apprenticeships and full time work) and many students have taken on new work experience and work placement while stepping up their commitment to completing year 12.

One of the many great outcomes of this term was students taking on mentoring roles with year 7 and 8 students. This ranged from assisting and guiding them with their garden projects, to sitting with these young students in class to hear them read. The positive results are evident in the relationships that are forming and in the feedback from teachers in the year 7 and 8 hubs.

To round up the term, we took our students on an excursion to Newcastle to complete an 'Amazing Race'. With a fancy-dress theme, 3 groups of 5 students took to the streets to learn about the local Metropolis, meet local people and generally have a hoot of a time. The unexpected outcome was a big lesson on time management, a real-world requirement. Another example of the benefits of regularly leaving school to learn.

Coming up in the final weeks of term is a trip down the Nymboida River. Students enrolled in the Certificate II Outdoor Recreation course will complete their second trip away, bringing them to the final stages of gaining this certificate.

Back on home turf, all students are involved in a 'work studies' project. In small groups they are taking on the decoration/ refurbishment of different parts of the Studio School learning environment. One group has taken on an initiative that will be of benefit to the whole school. Stand by for news there.

Year 9 and 10 Visual Arts students had the opportunity to attend Archibald Prize winning artist Wendy Sharpe 'Secrets' workshop at Maitland Regional Art Gallery. Students participated in a gallery tour led by MRAG Tutor, where students looked around the gallery and selected exhibitions looking and talking about the different ways artworks are made and the ideas behind the artworks.

Soon after, students were offered a unique insight into Wendy Sharpe's life, passion, artistic journey and prolific body of work. Students participated in an artmaking activity with a tutor from the Gallery teaching students to develop painting and drawing skills using various mediums.

Students drew inspiration directly from Sharpe's artworks that adorned the Gallery space working with a variety of mediums and technique in a rapid and expressive way. Special projects funds covered the participation fee of \$12 and bus fare for each student, as well as teacher relief for the supervising teacher to take the students.
